




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THE SUPER TASTY STORY SANDWICH

SETTING SALAD

Keep your story healthy by adding a description of the setting;

- Use all your senses to describe the places
- The reader should be able to imagine a picture of the scene from your writing
- Use this as an opportunity to select the most adventurous, yet appropriate vocabulary possible.

PROBLEM PEPPER

Spice things up with a fiery dilemma.

- · What goes wrong?
- How do the characters react?
- Will this be a surprise, or will you give clues, so that the reader sees it coming?

CLOSING SLICE

Finish with a satisfying ending.

- How does everything end?
- Have you linked back to the opening?

OPENING SLICE

Start things off well, but don't fill the reader up yet!

- How will you interest the reader and make them want to finish your story?
- · Remember not to give away too much!
- Have you planned how you will return to, or reference, this opening in your story ending?

CHARACTER CHEESE

Give your characters real flavour by describing;

- · What they look like
- · How they behave
- The things they say
- How other characters react to them
- The best character descriptions allow the reader to INFER things about the character, without actually saying them!

MEATY RESOLUTION

Solve the problem with a yummy resolution.

- How does the problem get resolved?
- Does everything go back to the way it was, or have things changed?
- <u>Does your story have a moral or a message</u> for the reader?
